WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE CITIZENS OF DONCASTER?

4. The Overview and Scrutiny function has the potential to impact upon all of the council's key objectives by holding decision makers to account, reviewing performance and developing policy. The Overview and Scrutiny of health is an important part of the Government's commitment to place patients at the centre of health services. It is a fundamental way by which democratically elected community leaders may voice the views of their constituents and require local NHS bodies to listen and respond. RISKS AND ASSUMPTIONS

This will provide an opportunity to ensure work plans can be regularly monitored and reviewed.

New Commissioning Model of Home Support to Be Known As Help to Live At Home in Doncaster

At an informal meeting of the Health and Adult Social Care Overview and Scrutiny that was held on the 8th September 2014, the Panel met to consider information regarding the forthcoming cabinet decision "To approve a new commissioning model of home support to be known as Help to Live At Home in Doncaster" which will replace the current framework agreement with numerous domiciliary care providers.

The Panel received information and a presentation from officers about the proposed model, the case for change and the benefits. There were a number of observations and comments raised during the meeting about the proposed model.

In summary, Members were supportive of the proposed model and the more personalised approach to care was welcomed by the Panel. In regards as to how individuals should be informed of the changes, the Panel favoured a two staged approach; firstly that written information should be sent out and secondly, that this should be followed with face-to-face meetings. Concerns were raised about how long it would take to carry out such meetings but Members were informed that this could be undertaken by the providers themselves. Some Members were of the opinion that the importance of family members should also be recognised in terms of support during this time.

Some of the other concerns and issues raised by the Panel that were discussed at the meeting included: -

- Monitoring quality assurance of providers and ensuring a high standard of care is maintained.
- Individuals being supported and encouraged to use direct payments and that effective monitoring of these are in place.

- The importance of the provision of long term support as well as short-term care.
- Whether the work can be undertaken within budget and if there will be sufficient staff in place to make it work.
- Ensuring the quality of the support plans in place.
- Receiving input on the model from those with disabilities.

Members of the Panel requested that regular update reports be provided following the meeting in the form of a briefing note followed by regular performance information updates to be brought back once the new arrangements have commenced late spring/early summer 2015.

On behalf of the Panel, I would like to thank Dave Hamilton, Director for Adults, Health and Wellbeing, Shane-Hayward Giles, Assistant Director of Modernisation and Commissioning and Rosemary Leek, Commissioning Manager for taking the time to attend the meeting and respond to questions raised from the Panel.

I would be grateful if you could provide a response to this letter no later than 12th October 2014.
