## DONCASTER METROPOLITAN BOROUGH COUNCIL

A MEETING of the ELECTIONS AND DEMOCRATIC STRUCTURES COMMITTEE was held in Room 007A - CIVIC OFFICE on TUESDAY, 10TH JULY, 2018, at 10.00 am.

#### 1 PERSONAL REFERENCE

In opening the meeting, the Chair stated that he wished to place on record his thanks to all of the former Members of the Committee for the contributions they had made to the work of the Committee, namely Councillors Sue McGuinness, Tina Reid, Majid Khan and, in particular, Kevin Rodgers. The Chair also welcomed Councillors Susan Durant, Mark Houlbrook, Lani-Mae Ball (absent) and Ken Keegan (absent) as new Members of the Committee, and Charlie Hogarth as a returning member of the Committee.

#### 2 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST, IF ANY

There were no declarations reported at the meeting.

#### 3 MINUTES OF THE ELECTIONS AND DEMOCRATIC STRUCTURES COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON 13TH MARCH 2018

RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 13th March 2018 be approved as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

#### 4 ELECTION RESULTS

The Committee received a report which provided a detailed update on the results of the Sheffield City Region Combined Authority Mayoral Election held on Thursday 3rd May 2018 and the Town Ward By-Election and Edlington Neighbourhood Planning Referendum held on Thursday 14th June 2018.

##### Combined Authority Mayoral Election – 3rd May 2018

The Electoral Services Manager summarised the results of the Sheffield City Region Combined Authority Mayoral Election held on 3rd May 2018 and answered a number of questions from Members. A full breakdown of the results and turnout was set out in Appendix A of the report.

Arising from discussion on the problems caused when the locations of polling stations had to be moved, at the suggestion of a Member, the Electoral Services Manager undertook to look into the possibility of posting a notice outside the old polling station, directing voters to the location of the new polling station, where there had been a change of venue since the last election.

#### Local Government Election – Town Ward – 14th June 2018

The Electoral Services Manager gave a brief summary of the outcome of the Town Ward By-Election held on 14th June 2018, which had resulted in Tosh McDonald being elected as a Councillor. In answer to a question, the Electoral Services Manager confirmed that the total estimated cost to the Council associated with running this By-Election was expected to be £10,000, which included the costs relating to the printing and delivery of poll cards, hire of polling stations and staffing costs.

#### Edlington Neighbourhood Planning Referendum – 14th June 2018

The Electoral Services Manager reported on the outcome of the Council's third Neighbourhood Planning Referendum election, held in Edlington on 14th June 2018, including the turnout figures.

During subsequent discussion, Members questioned where Neighbourhood Plans sat in relation to the other key components of the statutory development plan, including the Unitary Development Plan, and Councillors Houlbrook and Durant gave an update on the current status of the Thorne and Moorends Neighbourhood Development Plan. Arising from this discussion, Members concurred with a suggestion by the Chair that it would be useful if a Members' Seminar could be arranged on the subject of Neighbourhood Development Plans and their relationship with the other components of the Development Plan.

RESOLVED that the report be noted, and a request be made for a Members' Seminar to be arranged on the subject of Neighbourhood Development Plans and how they relate to the other plans comprising the statutory development plan.

### 5 INDIVIDUAL ELECTORAL REGISTRATION - PROGRESS REPORT

The Committee received a report from the Electoral Services Manager providing Members with an update on the key plans to be undertaken by the Electoral Services Team in relation to the Register of Electors and Annual Canvass and the current electorate breakdown.

It was reported that plans were being put in place to commence this year's annual canvass in August, and that the initial Household Enquiry Form was to be sent out to 138,600 properties within the Borough. Reminder letters would be sent out to non-responding properties in September, then again in October. During September to November, telephone and door to door canvassing would also be undertaken in relation to any outstanding non-responding properties.

Members were advised that a proactive approach was required throughout the year and not just during the canvass period in order to maintain an accurate and complete register, ensuring as far as possible that all eligible persons were on the register and

that all non-eligible persons were removed. Details of the initiatives being currently undertaken were presented within paragraph 6 of the report.

It was noted that as of the 1st June 2018, the full electorate was 223,607 and a full electorate breakdown by ward was attached at Appendix A of the report.

The Electoral Services Manager explained that Members could play a valuable role in helping the team to spread the word and encourage people to get on the Electoral Register and she stated that the Elections Team could provide Members with material to help with publicity in their respective Wards. In answer to a question, the Electoral Services Manager confirmed that posters were being produced for display in public buildings such as libraries, providing information for the public on how to register.

Arising from a query as regards the impact of new housing developments on the Electoral Register, the Committee requested information on the numbers of new houses that have appeared in each Ward over the past few years.

In response to a further query on postal votes, the Electoral Services Manager undertook to provide Members with a breakdown detailing the proportion of postal voters in each Ward.

The Electoral Services Manager confirmed, in reply to a question as to whether a landlord could be registered at his/her flats, that the landlord could only be registered at the address where he/she resided.

After the Chair had re-affirmed that the Committee was hugely impressed with, and proud of, the Council's Electoral Services Team, it was

#### **ELECTIONS/BY-ELECTIONS/REFERENDUMS UPDATE**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

1. This report provides Members with a detailed update and the results of the Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council – East Ward By-Election, Askern Town Council By-Election and the Armthorpe Neighbourhood Planning Referendum all held on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> September 2018.

#### **WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE CITIZENS OF DONCASTER?**

4. Having accessible and well organised elections is key to public engagement in the democratic process. Elections are the cornerstone of our democratic process and are important to all of our residents. Elections give the electorate the opportunity to hold politicians to account and shape the future direction of national and local government. Neighbourhood Planning Referendums allow local communities to influence and take more control of decisions around planning in their areas.

#### **BACKGROUND**

5. Elections and Referendums are significant projects, which are delivered by a small core team with polling stations supported by internal staff from across the Council.

## **Armthorpe Neighbourhood Planning Referendum**

6. The Council's fourth Neighbourhood Planning Referendum took place in Armthorpe on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> September 2018. The purpose of this report is to provide the results of the referendum.

There was an eligible electorate of 10,857 electors of which 2,938 had requested Postal Votes. 1,196 postal votes (40.71%) were returned and personal identifiers correctly verified. A further 3 postal votes were rejected and those electors will be notified accordingly. As well as those Postal Votes issued there were five polling stations on polling day which 339 (4.28%) electors visited to vote.

In total 1,535 electors cast their vote, of which 3 were rejected for voting for more than one answer, 1 for writing or a mark by which the voter could be identified and 1 for being unmarked, making a turnout of 14.14%.

The outcome of the Referendum was in favour of using the Neighbourhood Plan for Armthorpe to help decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area and the result was reported to Full Council on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2018. A full breakdown of the results can be found at **Appendix A** of this report.

## **Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council - East ward**

7. Due to resignation of a sitting councillor a vacancy occurred for a Parish Councillor in the Sprotbrough & Cusworth East Ward. A By-Election was called by 10 local government electors from the Sprotbrough & Cusworth East Ward requesting to fill the vacancy by holding an election. A By-Election was held on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> September 2018 and this report provides a detailed update to Members on the by-election and results.

There was an eligible electorate of 1,856 electors of which 476 had Postal Votes issued and 216 (45.38%) were returned and personal identifiers correctly verified. A further c postal votes were rejected and those electors will be notified accordingly. As well as those Postal Votes issued there was one polling station on polling day which 88 (6.38%) electors visited to vote.

In total 304 electors cast their vote, of which 1 was rejected for voting for more than one candidate, marking a turnout of 16.38%.

There were four candidates and David James McMullan was elected as a Parish Councillor for Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council - East ward; a full breakdown of the results can be found at **Appendix B** of this report.

The costs of this election will be charged to the Parish Council.

8. **Askern Town Council**

A vacancy was also advertised and called by ten electors for Askern Town Council. However, there was only one nomination received, therefore the election was uncontested and the candidate Hayley Royle (Independent) was automatically elected.

9. **Upcoming By-Elections**

Further to two recent vacancies advertised, both were called by ten electors for the vacancy within Askern Town Council and Sprotbrough & Cusworth Parish Council – Cusworth Ward to be filled by an election. Both Elections will take place on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> December 2018 with the Verification and Count taking place the following day, Friday 7<sup>th</sup> December at the Civic Office. The cost of these elections will be charged to the Town/Parish Councils.

#### **ANNUAL CANVASS – PROGRESS REPORT**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

1. This report provides an update to Members on a number of key work streams being undertaken by the Electoral Services Team in relation to the Register of Electors and Annual Canvass.

#### **WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE CITIZENS OF DONCASTER?**

4. Ensuring the Electoral Register is as up to date as possible and carrying out proactive electoral activity is key to public engagement to ensure residents are registered to enable them to vote when an election occurs.

#### **BACKGROUND**

5. Each year the Council has a duty to review its Electoral Register to ensure it is up to date by carrying out a full review and annual canvass, before publishing a new revised Electoral Register on the 1<sup>st</sup> December each year. As well as the annual canvass, ongoing Individual Electoral Registration proactive initiatives are needed to capture people moving properties, working with Registrars to obtain death lists, anyone changing their name and capturing those upcoming 16 year olds.

## **Annual Canvass**

6. The annual canvass commenced in August 2018, at that point there were 138,591 properties in Doncaster and an electorate of 223,335. We received 76,692 (55.28%) responses to the initial Household Enquiry Form (HEF) without any prompting. Those responses came via the internet, post, text or telephone. HEF reminders were issued in September then a further 2<sup>nd</sup> stage reminder was issued in October leaving approx 35,000 properties left to canvass. During September to November we carried out telephone canvassing as well as canvassers out door knocking the remaining outstanding non-responding properties.
7. Throughout the canvass approx. 15,631 'Invitation to Register' (ITR) forms for new applicants to be added to the electoral register have been issued, these include any electors who may have moved. We have received 18,351 new registrations; these also include those people who have moved from one property to another within the borough. There are also 227 electors whose applications are either awaiting verification from Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) or which we are trying to obtain further information for, in order to get them on the electoral register.
8. We will be doing what we can to encourage all of the above to turn into actual verified electors by doing a telephone canvass and personal visits to any non-responding HEF and ITR forms and processing the information instantly and sending it to DWP for verification. Any queries returned from DWP will be investigated quickly to try and turn them to a verified elector.
9. A full breakdown by return method in comparison to 2015, 2016 and 2017 can be found at **appendix A** of this report.
10. To help increase the response to the annual canvass and increase the number of electors on the electoral register Electoral Services are currently being proactive by:

### **Telephone Canvassing**

Following the success of previous years we are undertaking a Telephone Canvass alongside the door knock canvass. This enables us to contact those hard to reach areas/electors. We are now focussing on an ITR canvass to chase up the non-responding electors to try and obtain the information there and then over the phone; we also have a dedicated phone line for electors to call us back with their information should they not have it to hand at the time of the call.

### **Care Homes & HMO's**

We have dedicated Canvass Team Leaders which are canvassing every care home and housing with multiple occupancies (HMO) within the borough by arranging an appointment with the Care Manager and/or Building Manager to build up a close working relationship to ensure we are kept up to date on the frequent residential changes. Only people residing at a property may register at a property for example landlords and carers may not register at a property unless they actually live there.

### **Targeting hard to reach/unapproachable areas**

Where necessary extra support and time has been given to selective areas such as foreign nationals that may not understand how to complete the form. We have now obtained forms in 25 different languages. SLHD have provided access to high rise flats and buildings. We have also targeted hard to reach areas by telephone.

### **School/Colleges**

We are working with Schools and Colleges through their social media links by providing schools with adverts and information to put on their social media to try and increase the number of attainers ready for when they reach voting age. We currently have approx. 2,824 attainers on the register, at the start of the annual canvass there were 2,159.

### **Social Media**

Social media updates are sent out via facebook and twitter through 'My Doncaster' pages to provide information to Doncaster residents from the Electoral Commission and Cabinet Office and encouraging them to respond to the HEF and register online.

11. The work undertaken during the annual canvass will contribute to the annual Electoral Register that will be published on the 1<sup>st</sup> December 2018.
