LICENSING COMMITTEE

Licensing Act 2003, Gambling Act 2005 and General Licensing Update

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. The purpose of this report is to update Members on the activities of the Committee and Sub Committee in the previous year, issues relating to the Licensing Act 2003, the Gambling Act 2005, upcoming matters and any significant licensing enforcement actions.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2. It is recommended that Members note the matters referred to in points 2.1 to 2.4 below.
- 2.1 For the period 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 the following committees were convened
 - Licensing Committee 2 occasions
 - Licensing Sub-Committee 13 occasions

A total of 13 applications / notices were determined by the Licensing Sub-Committee, all of which were applications made under the Licensing Act 2003.

- 2.2 Statistical details of all other licence applications (Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005) determined by the Authority and a summary of significant licensing enforcement actions, for the period 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019, are attached as Appendix A.
- 2.3 Consultation has recently been undertaken by the Department for Transport on draft Statutory Guidance on Taxi and Private Hire Vehicle licensing. The Council's existing hackney carriage and private hire licensing policy (taxi policy) remains unchanged.

2.4 A restructure of the Regulation & Enforcement Service has resulted in a change of management of the Licensing staff responsible for the processing of applications, the issuing of licences, permits and registrations and the enforcement of the same.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE CITIZENS OF DONCASTER

3. By noting the recommendations of this report, the Licensing Committee are kept aware of the latest developments and forthcoming issues thereby ensuring they continue to be best placed to make future licensing decisions.

BACKGROUND

- 4. The Licensing Committee have historically requested that the Committee be furnished with details of the licensing decisions (Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005), that are delegated outside the remit of the Committee and Sub-Committee, at least annually at the inaugural meeting. Statistical details of these decisions along with a summary of the significant enforcement actions taken by the Trading Standards & Licensing service are attached at Appendix A. The figures are based on licence applications and enforcement actions that were received and completed respectively during the period 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019. The figures relating to sub-committees refer to hearings that were convened during the above period but they may also include decisions on some applications that were received in the latter part of the previous year.
- 5. The Council have responsibility for the licensing and regulation of the hackney carriage (taxi) and private hire trades. Whilst licensing decisions are delegated to officer level, it is within the remit of the Licensing Committee to determine policy and advise on the preparation, content and implementation of taxi licensing polices. The Council's existing policy and guidelines concerning the relevance of convictions for new and existing licence holders in the taxi and private hire trades was adopted in 2012 and is based on Home Office guidance issued in the early 1990s. Whilst each application must be considered on its individual merits, guidelines covering recommended minimum periods free of conviction for offences falling into broad categories act as a guideline to decision makers and afford potential applicants the ability to make an informed decision as to whether or not to apply.
- 6. Following a period of consultation, the Institute of Licensing published new guidance, in April 2018, on determining the suitability of applicants and licences in the hackney carriage and private hire trades. This Committee previously consented on a consultation with all interested parties with a view to this new guidance being adopted by Doncaster Council.
- 7. Before consultation could take place, the Department for Transport (DfT) began its own consultation on the *Taxi and Private Hire vehicle licensing:* protecting users (Draft Section 177 Statutory Guidance). This document includes elements of the Institute of Licensing's published guidance.

- 8. The consultation, which was open to all interested parties including licensing authorities and the licensed trade, ended on 22 April 2019. The licensing authority provided it's response following consultation with the chair of this committee.
- 9. Once the results of the consultation have been determined and the Statutory Guidance has been published, any proposed changes to the Councils taxi policy, will be brought before this Licensing Committee.
- 10. The Licensing team previously sat within the Business Safety & Licensing Department which was managed by Mr Paul Williams. Following a restructure the Licensing team are now part of Trading Standards & Licensing and the Regulatory Manager is Mr Dave McMurdo.

HEALTH IMPLICATIONS [Officer Initials CT Date 21.5.19]

- 19. Public Health welcomes the statutory guidance in relation to private hire and hackney carriage licensing and would be keen to provide a public health aspect to the policy if and when revised.
 - It is imperative the public are secure in the knowledge that they are safe using this mode of transport and procedures are in place and being utilised to address vehicle and licensing issues.
 - With regard to the permits licensed under the Gambling Act 2005 Public Health is pleased to see that numbers issued are low which is in line with the ambition to offer less opportunity for gambling and gaming across the borough.

There has been a 13% increase in all alcohol-attributable admissions to DRI from April 2013 to March 2018 in particular alcoholic liver disease which has risen by 59% in this time. Many of these increases have become concentrated in males and females over age 50 and who live in deprived areas. Public Health will continue to work with Licensing to reduce these numbers through initiatives such as Reduce the Strength and Best Bar None.
